ROC Project Centre

The Project Centre offers made-to-measure working and learning routes, support and guidance in the broadest sense of the word. Routes are offered to people whose 'distance' to the labour market / education is great or to long-term unemployed.

Annually, the Project Centre offers 52 places to participants; 80% of them succeed in moving on.
