

What PLYA wants to be?

... the stage on the way of life long learning, where young person can stop for a while and listen to her/himself: to reflect upon the past and present life, to get encouragement and new experiences that help her/him to lead the life as she or he would like to live in the future...



- •Unemployed, dropouts
- Age between 15 and 25 (majority around 20)
- They have no education or vocational qualification












Support any learning when they want to achieve the concrete life/situational goals







Four modes of project work/learning

- Commonly Selected Project Work (it is based on the common interests of the whole learning group)
- Production Based Project Work (hand made craft production or different services, where students learn not only how to make the product, but also what is needed for and how to organize the production and business management)
- Individual learning projects (are based upon individual interests of participant; mostly preparing the participant to complete/continue their interrupted schooling)
- The Activities of Students Interests (short- one to three days activities suggested by the student group that help to rise the common spirit of the group trip, excursion, picnic, cinema, sport event etc. or find the project idea).

The PLYA Learning Principles

 Learning problems are identify by studentsindividually or commonly

- Learning is organized within projects learning aims are derived from projects goals and within project tasks
- Democratic atmosphere
- Mentors are helpers/counselors and not masters of student's learning
- PLYA cooperate with local, national and EU environment
